Takayori Atsumi

Taki Atsumi was born in Japan before World War II, immigrating to the United States at 22 years of age to study at the New England Conservatory of Music, Boston, with the support of a Congregational Church in Springfield, Vermont. He became a naturalized United States citizen in 1968. Taki came to ASU's Music Department in 1964. He has performed solo recitals in some of the world's major concert houses and in significant American art galleries. He was named "Chevalier du Violoncelli" by Indiana University, Bloomington, and will be a member of the International Jury for the Third International Leonard Rose Cello Competition, May 2001, at the University of Maryland. Mstislav Rostropovich invited him to be one of the soloists and pedagogues at the Second World Cello Congress, in St. Petersburg, Russia, 1997. Rostropovich also asked him to be the Executive Director of the 7th American Cello Congress-Rostropovich Festival, to be held at ASU's School of Music, May 2003. Mr. Atsumi is a member of the New Art String Quartet, with whom he recorded works of Vincent Persichetti. As principal cellist for the Phoenix Symphony, Mr. Atsumi premiered Shostakovich's "Cello Concerto #1 in E-flat major" with the Phoenix Symphony Orchestra as well as several standard cocertos.. He performed eight seasons with the Boston Symphony and the Boston Pops, and with the National Symphony Orchestra in Washington, D. C., which he once conducted. He also played with the NHK Philharmonic Orchestra, then the major Japanese orchestra in Tokyo. He has helped bring to the Valley some of the most important cellists of the last several decades, including Pablo Casals, Mstislav Rostropovich, Pierre Fournier, Gregor Piatigorsky, Enno Bolognini, Daniel Shafran, Janus Starker, and Yo Yo Ma. Mr. Atsumi is the Founder and President of the Arizona Cello Society, who is the co-sponsor of this evening along with Arizona State University's School of Music. He is also the Founder of Los Celistas, an eight member all cello chamber group. He has performed under leading conductors such as Charles Munch, William Steinberg, Howard Mitchell, Arthur Fiedler, Erich Leinsdorff, Zubin Mehta, and Claudio Abbado.
