She is currently pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in choral conducting. From 1988 to 1995 she was a member of the music faculty at Grand Canyon University, where she served as the Director of Choirs from 1993-1995. In addition to her teaching experience, McCreary has served in a number of church music positions in various denominations. An ordained minister, Rev. McCreary is currently the Minister of Music and Worship at Community Church of Hope in Phoenix, AZ. In addition to her work at CCH, she is also the Artistic Director for Arizona Women in Tune, a women's community chorus which is affiliated with GALA, an international choral association.

Ryan Smit is presently working on his Master's degree in Choral Music Education. He recently received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Choral and Instrumental Education from Dordt College in Sioux Center, Iowa, where he was the principal assistant conductor for the Dordt College Kantorei and an assistant conductor for the Dordt College Campus Band. He also sings with the Phoenix Bach Choir and serves as Music Director for Hope Community Church in Scottsdale. Ryan and his wife Amie live in Tempe, along with their two-month-old son Caleb.

Alicia Wright was born in Eugene, Oregon and later attended Willamette University in nearby Salem. At Willamette, Alicia studied vocal performance where she played such roles as Yum-Yum in *The Mikado* and Poppea in *The Coronation of Poppea*. She is presently working towards her Master's degree in Choral Music Education while also taking coursework to receive her teaching certificate. Alicia is currently student teaching at Westwood High School under the tutelage of Jeff Harris. She will also get a chance to student teach at the elementary level during the fall semester.
