

LYRIC OPERA THEATRE

One of the most popular musicals of all time, Godspell, tells of the last seven days of Jesus' life according to the Gospel of St. Matthew. The Scarecrow is an operatic adaptation of Hawthorne's tale of a living scarecrow, created out of malevolence, as he discovers love and what it means to be human and to determine his own fate. Hello, Jerry! A special engagement concert celebrating the songs and lyrics of Broadway legend Jerry Herman as performed by some of today's biggest Broadway stars.

Godspell runs Sept. 29 & 30; Oct. 1, 4 & 6-8. Hello Jerry! runs Oct. 28. The Scarecrow runs Nov. 17 & 18; Dec. 1 & 2.

The Lost Ones is set in a post-apocalyptic future and tells the story of two boys who have lost their childhood to war, while offering an affirmation of the resilience, optimism and generosity of the human spirit. Haroun and the Sea of Stories, a bold theatrical adaptation of Salman Rushdie's novelistic celebration of storytelling, tells the tale of a boy's love for his father, punctuated by messages about the importance of free speech and independent thought. Festival of New Work premiers four new plays by ASU graduate students with two productions, Skylark Dreams and The House Where Nobody Lives, and two staged readings.

The Lost Ones runs Sept. 21, 23, 24, & 28-30; Oct. 1. Haroun and the Sea of Stories runs Oct. 13-15 & 19-22. Festival of New Work runs Nov. 9-19.

DANCE

Rhythms of Life: Drums and Dances from Africa explores African influence on Western dance with visiting artists Agbe Nunya, Axé Capoeira, Cuban Connection, Joel Valentin-Martinez and Sule Wilson. Moving Ground features guest choreographer Nora Chipaumire of the Urban Bush Women, who sets work combining the spiritual elements of traditional African and Caribbean dance with contemporary, Western dance.

Rhythms of Life: Drums and Dances from Africa runs Nov. 3-5. Moving Ground runs Nov. 16-19.

ORGAN

An Italian baroque organ built by Domenico Traeri in 1742 joins the Fritts organ this season. The King of Instruments Meets the Instrument of Kings marks the first public performance on the Traeri organ, exploring the sounds of organ and trumpet. It Takes Two to Tango is an evening of duets showcasing the magnificent Fritts organ, with four hands and feet! The 4th Annual Organ Christmas Concert celebrates the music of Christmas in the Organ Hall, appropriately decorated for the occasion.

The King of Instruments Meets the Instrument of Kings runs Sept. 24. It Takes Two to Tango runs Nov. 5. 4th Annual Organ Christmas Concert runs Dec. 9 & 10.

New this season, the series explores the music of jazz legends as well as works of today's hottest jazz artists. Joe Corral, jazz flutist and local favorite, joins the ASU Concert Jazz Band for a fabulous evening.

Biographies

Kimberly Ann Badger (Lady Governor) a recent graduate of Utah State University, is a Master of Music candidate in Opera Performance. This is her Lyric Opera Theatre debut.

Ryan C. Keller (Justice Goodkin) a native of St. Louis is a Master of Music candidate in Opera Performance. This is his Lyric Opera Theatre debut.

Gary W. Hill (Conductor) is Professor of Music and Director of Bands at Arizona State University where he conducts the Wind Symphony and the Chamber Winds, teaches graduate conducting, and is founder of the Digital Conducting Laboratory. Prior to Hill's appointment at ASU, he was Director of Bands at the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music, where he also served as Music Director for the Kansas City Youth Wind Ensemble, and conducted two professional groups: the Kansas City Symphony Brass Ensemble and newEar, a chamber ensemble devoted to contemporary music. Previously, he held a similar post at East Texas State University and was Associate Director of Bands at the University of Colorado, Boulder. Hill began his teaching career in Michigan where he served as Director of Bands for the West Bloomfield and Traverse City public schools. High school, university, and professional ensembles under Hill's direction have given performances for the National Band Association, the Music Educators National Conference, the College Band Directors National Association, the International Horn Symposium, the National Flute Association, at many state conventions, and throughout North America, and Europe. Performances conducted by him have consistently drawn praise from composers, performing musicians, and critics alike for their insightful, inspired, and cohesive realizations, and for their imaginative programming.

As a guest conductor and clinician, appearances in a dozen countries and most of the states have included performances with myriad high school honor bands, numerous college and university wind bands and orchestras, at the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic, and at World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles' conferences. Additionally, he is in constant demand as a conducting teacher and as a clinician for bands and orchestras. Hill's current research is two-fold: he is engaged in an ongoing investigation of digital technologies applicable to the conducting classroom, with an emphasis on motion capture technology; and he is writing a book on the past, present, and future of wind band. Hill is a member of numerous professional organizations including the Music Educators National Conference, The Society for American Music, The American Bandmasters Association, and the College Band Directors National Association, for which he hosted the Fiftieth Anniversary National Conference (1991) as well as the joint conferences of the North Central and Southwestern Divisions in conjunction with The Society for American Music (1998), served as president of the Southwestern Division (1989-91), and as national president (2003-05).

Brianna Kramer (Mother Rigby) originally from Lacey, WA, is a Doctoral of Musical Arts candidate in Voice Performance. She was last seen with Lyric Opera Theater as Madame de Croissey in *Dialogue of the Carmelites*.

F. Scott Scripps (Governor) a Dallas native, is a first year Master of Music candidate in Opera Performance. This is his Lyric Opera Theatre debut.

James Smart (Conductor) has a broad repertoire in wind, orchestral, and opera works and is particularly interested in promoting new music. He holds a Bachelor of Music from The University of Michigan and a Master of Music from Arizona State University where he is also currently pursuing a Doctorate of Musical Arts in Conducting. Mr. Smart's conducting teachers include Gary Hill, William Reber, H. Robert Reynolds, Timothy Russell, Kevin Sedatole, and James Tapia. He has continued his conducting studies in workshops with William Larue Jones, Kenneth Kiesler, Craig Kirchhoff, and Allan McMurray.

Before coming to ASU to pursue his doctorate, he was Director of Bands and Brass Studies at Southern Utah University and Assistant Conductor of the Orchestra of Southern Utah. While at SUU, Mr. Smart conducted the Symphony Band, brass ensemble, and athletic bands, and taught classes in advanced conducting, applied brass, and music education methods. His work at SUU created increased participation, quality, and notoriety for the institution. In April of 2006, Mr. Smart conducted the SUU Wind Symphony in the world premier of *Raag Mala: the music of India through Western ears* by Pulitzer Prize winning composer Michael Colgrass. Mr. Smart organized the fully funded commission and residency by the composer.

Mr. Smart taught public school in Lapeer, MI in one of the strongest band programs in the state. He has guest conducted and/or adjudicated ensembles in Arizona, Idaho, Nevada, Michigan, and Utah. He has also been a participant in the Conductors Retreat at Medomak, the International Workshop for Orchestral Conducting (Graz, Austria), and the Band Conductors Art Symposium (Ann Arbor, MI).

Allison Stanford (Polly Goodkin) a native of Conway, Arkansas, is a Master of Music candidate in Opera Performance. She was last seen with Lyric Opera Theater as a Pharisee in Godspell.

Ashley Warren (Stage Manager) is a freshman in the School of Theatre and Film at Arizona State University. She plans to get her teaching certification and teach high school theater. Ashley has stage managed productions with East Valley Children's Theatre and Chandler-Gilbert Community College. She is thrilled to be given the opportunity to stage manages with the Lyric Opera Theatre.

Jamilyn Manning White (Polly Goodkin), a native of Logan, Utah, is a Master of Music candidate in Opera Performance. This is her Lyric Opera Theatre debut.

Graham Whitehead (Director) was born in Egypt, raised in England, lived in Canada for almost thirty years and now resides in the United States. Since becoming a permanent resident of the U.S., he has taught at Arizona State University, served as an Associate Artistic Director at Childsplay in Tempe, Arizona and worked as a freelance actor and director. Directing highlights include Fiddler on the Roof, Dear Esther, Dialogues of the Carmelites, Cabaret, Into the Woods, A Little Night Music, Pippin, Carousal, Comedy of Errors, Driving Miss Daisy, Chorus Line, Rumours, Once Upon a Mattress, You Can't Take It With You, The Rape of Lucretia, Anything Goes and Comet in Moominland. For the Kennedy Center, Graham has directed The Reluctant Dragon, East of the Sun, West of the Moon, The Emperor's New Clothes and most recently, the new musical Willy Wonka. As a playwright, he has written two plays, Just So Stories, and Peter and the Wolf, which have won awards as outstanding productions from the international puppetry organization UNIMA. At Childsplay, Graham has directed numerous pieces including Wolf Child, And Then They Came for Me, Wind in the Willows, Selkie, Boxcar Children, Yellow Boat, Eric and Elliott and Old Jake's Skirts. He has also appeared as Lincoln in Lincoln's Log and, dressed in extremely warm upholstery, he played the Chair in Y. York's Portrait, Wind and Chair. In addition, he directed Androcles and the Lion for Free Space Theatre in Orel, Russia and made a cameo appearance as the voice of God in Castles in the Sky, which he directed and co-created with Gayle LaJoie. Playing God was much cooler than playing an armchair.

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
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
